Members of USPS District 16 primarily know me as the District Executive Officer and maybe more so as the District's "Liaison Officer to USCG/USCGAux". I also have collateral duty as the District's "Homeland Security Officer". Duties of that position include encouraging USPS members to be prepared for natural or manmade disasters.

A "weather event" around where I work caused Boeing to implement an emergency "shelter in place" and plant shutdown. This event reminded me about being prepared for what Mother Nature throws at you. Are you aware that your neighborhood is basically the last area help will arrive? They will take care of your kids/grandkids at school long before getting to your neighborhood. Are you prepared?

You hear the news media talk about being prepared for 3 days. But in reality you should be prepared for much longer.

Do you know how to safely turn-off you water, gas and/or electric feeds to your house. Do you have food and water that won't spoil and enough for several days for everyone in the house? Remember you could be without means to cook or have running water. Don't forget your pets.

Are you prepared to deal with triage medical situations? Again it may be a long time before medical help will be able to arrive. You need to be trained and be prepared to make some very hard decisions. Dealing with a dead or dying person takes up very critical resources.

How would you go about safely rescuing trapped people? What skills do you have using cribbing methods to lift heavy objects safely? Are you familiar with using fire extinguishers (have you actually used one)? Are you familiar with the proper marking methods so the emergency personal are able to determine how

How are you going to pay for supplies when electricity is gone? Credit cards don't work without electricity and internet connections. Generator take fuel and without a method to pay for it that will run out.

much and the type of situations needing attention when they drive through assessing the neighborhood?

Have you set up an out of state check in contact? That contact would be where everyone that is important to you checks in, reports condition & location, and can pass along messages. Using cell phone text messages is the best method (much more reliable system).

Do you have an emergency to go bag (similar idea to the "ditch bag" for a boat) available? This needs to be available when you're unable to get into your house. It should include food, medical supplies, and comfort items for yourself. Think about having these located in your cars, boat, and RV.

If you aren't able to answer yes (for REAL) to ALL of the above you are not prepared. And you should take "Community Emergency Response Team" (CERT) training. This training is available in each city/town for its citizens or people that work there. It is typically provided by the Fire Department and/or Emergency Management Department. CERT educates individuals about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Using training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT volunteers can assist others in their community following a disaster when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT volunteers are also encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking an active role in emergency preparedness projects.

NOTICE TO ALL MARINERS WHO USE GPS EQUIPMENT

On 6-7 April, a parameter in the GPS system will "roll over" to zero, which may affect older GPS equipment, or equipment that has not received firmware or software updates recently.

Background: The GPS satellite constellation transmits the exact time to all GPS receivers. The format for this information includes a parameter that represents the week, called the GPS week number. The week number has been counting incrementally by 1 since January 5th, 1980, and is an integral part of the navigation message received by all GPS receivers. When the week number reaches 1024 at 18 seconds before midnight (UTC) on April 6th, 2019, it will reset to zero as it keeps counting. This has happened once before - in August of 1999.

Older GPS receivers, or receivers that have not been provided manufacturer updates, may be impacted by the rollover. The impact might occur in April, or could affect such equipment at a later date. On these receivers the date might revert back to August 1999, or may revert to another date. Since this issue does not affect the other parts of the GPS navigation message, (it only affects the date), the receiver's ability to calculate the position and to display the exact time of day should not be impacted.

If you are operating a relatively recently-made piece of GPS equipment, it has likely been designed to handle this rollover event. If you regularly update your equipment's software/firmware with manufacturer updates, it has likely been prepared to handle it. If you are unsure, check with your manufacturer. If the equipment was built to the following published specification, it will handle the rollover without problem: Global Positioning Systems Directorate Systems Engineering and Integration Interface Specification, IS-GPS-200.

If your receiver shows symptoms similar to those describes above, it is recommended that you contact your equipment manufacturer for further assistance.

To best prepare for this rollover event, users of GPS equipment who are concerned should update their firmware, or contact their equipment manufacturer to ensure their equipment is ready for this event.

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Expensive Copyright lesson

How many of us have searched the internet for that perfect image? We want it for a flyer, class material, website, and etc. When you find it have you confirmed the copyright status? Not doing that may be a costly mistake.

Poverty Bay was creating their website and looking for perfect pictures to show off the great boating in the PNW. Images were found via a Google search of images. Due diligence was used to determine if the images were copyrighted. One of the images appeared to be good to go because there was no link or indications of copyright or ownership on the image. That image was included on the website.

Everything is good right? Well then came the "Unauthorized Use of Photograph" notice. The notice was sent out by an agent of the photographer. The notice quoted the Copyright Act of 1976 that says use of copyright material is an infringement regardless of your knowledge of the infringement or your intent. That penalties and damages can range up to \$150,000 not including expenses and costs. The notice offered the opportunity to purchase a license for use of the image for a fee of \$750.

Poverty Bay reached out for advice from the District's Law Officer (attorney), John Sherrick. John forwarded the request onto the USPS National legal office. It quickly made its' way to the USPS copyright attorney. The attorney discussed the situation with the squadron and reviewed the evidence and the notice. Case history was researched. The attorney recommended the squadron pay the \$750, because that is the minimum that courts have awarded for copyright infringement.

Poverty Bay paid the \$750 license fee and removed the image from the website. The image was removed because the license is good only for one year. Lessons learned:

- Don't assume images found on the internet are available for free use. It isn't uncommon for people to remove watermarks and/or links to the rightful owner before re-posting them on the internet. The only items that are (generally) available for clear use specify they're "Public Domain". But even "Public Domain" needs to be used carefully because unscrupulous people have been known to re-post copyright items as "Public Domain". The best is to use items that you're able locate the rightful owner and find out what they require for using the item. This could be as simple as giving the owner credit or paying a license fee.
- If the squadron finds itself with any form of legal issues contact the District's Law Officer for advice. That is a service available to the squadrons and district. Don't attempt to resolve legal issues (even if you're not sure it is) without conferring with the Law Officer (attorney).

THE POWER OF ONE

If everyone recruited just ONE person each year we would double in size in about a year. Sounds so simple but, it is difficult because many of us don't like to ASK someone to join us (it is selling). The worst they can do is say no. ASK a friend. ASK the person whose VSC you did. ASK the person who wonders about the insignia on your shirt or cap. ASK the person who took a class or seminar. Just ASK someone!

Coast Guard urges owners to label their paddle craft

SEATTLE — In the month of July search and rescue crews responded to an average of one unmanned-adrift paddle craft in the Puget Sound region every day, and now the Coast Guard seeks the help of all owners of kayaks, canoes and other paddle craft to label their vessel with essential contact information.

Every unmanned-adrift paddle craft is treated as a potential distress situation, however, when the craft is properly labelled the situation can often be quickly resolved with a phone call to the vessel owner, which minimizes personnel fatigue and negative impacts on crew readiness.

Paddle craft owners should label their vessel using a permanent or waterproof marker covered with clear waterproof tape for increased durability, or check with their local outdoor recreation retailer or <u>Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla</u> to obtain a Paddle Smart Identification Sticker. At the very least the label should include the name of the owner, a number to reach them and a secondary point of contact.

In 60 percent of the responses the owner or reason for the adrift vessel was never found and the search was

suspended with no signs of distress. In 25 percent of the responses the owner is found or they contacted the Coast Guard to state they had lost their craft. In 15 percent of the responses, the vessel was presumed abandoned/derelict based on damage or signs of age.

Helicopter crews and boat crews individually search an average of two hours per response with a similar amount of search-time spent by other government agency personnel, as well as an additional four hours of investigation by Coast Guard command center and 911 center personnel.

EVERETT JUMPS IN by Darcy Baker

The Everett Sail and Power Squadron, now known as America's Boating Club of Snohomish County, recently conducted an in-the-pool life jacket test and water rescue practice. As part of the exercise, Squadron members reviewed life jacket types, purposes, and correct fitting of both positive buoyance jackets and arming of inflatable jackets.

With the basics reviewed, participants jumped in the water fully clothed, deploying inflatable life jackets as necessary. This experience highlighted the importance of wearing the jackets securely against the body and inspecting inflatable jackets before boating. One Squadron member jumped in the pool, not realizing his inflatable jacket was not armed. This unexpected event illustrated the importance of a pre-boating check of life jackets.

Participants also tried to put on a jacket while treading water, which was extremely difficult to accomplish, proving the importance of wearing the jacket before a boater needs it.

Once in the water, members practiced strategies for huddling together to conserve body heat and the individual Heat Escape Lessening Posture ("Help") for preserving body heat. These skills are important in the chilly Pacific Northwest waters, where water temperatures range between the upper 40s to low 50s degrees.

In addition to life jacket training, participants examined and practiced with tossable safety devices, including bagged rope, seat cushions, life slings, and life rings. They examined a floating, stocked "ditch bag" and practiced with it in the water.

Participants also learned about emergency immersion suits, and Squadron Commander Gary L. Baker donned a suit, jumped in, and demonstrated this important emergency device.

Once out of water and dried off, members practiced the proper re-arming of inflatable life jackets.

This event provided a safe learning opportunity, demonstration, and hands on experience for Squadron members in life jackets and water rescue techniques. The chance to practice in advance of an emergency built confidence and prepared the participants for a real emergency, when and if it strikes on the water.
